Math activities


Find the area- Use a tape measure or ruler to measure and record the side lengths of various household objects. Use multiplication to find the area.

Pepperoni Pizza- One or more people can play this game. Materials: dice, paper, pencil. The first roll tells them how many pizzas to draw.

The second roll tells them how many pepperonis to put on EACH pizza.

Then they write the number sentence that will help them answer the question, "How many pepperonis in all?"

For example, I roll a dice and get 4 so I draw 4 big pizzas. I roll again and I get 3 so I put three pepperonis on each pizza. Then I write $4 \times 3 = 12$ and that tells me that there are 12 pepperonis in all.



Addition and subtraction Roll'em:

Students roll a die and record the number until they have two 3-digit numbers. Then add or subtract the numbers to solve.


Writing activities

Interview a family member: Ask a family member about their childhood and any memorable experiences they have had. Record your questions and their answers. You could even add your own illustrations!

Journal keeping: Keep a journal/diary of all your activities during Spring Break and the school closure Different ending: After reading a favorite picture or chapter book, write a different ending, or create a new story with the same characters and setting.

Reading activities

Story map: Create a story map for every book you read (or movie you watch!). Be sure to include details about the setting, characters, plot (including events, problem, and solution).



Read to someone else: Practice your "out loud" reading skills to someone or something else. Read to a sibling, grandparent, pet or stuffed animal. Rereading a book is a good idea and improves our fluency skill(you reading out loud should sound how you talk out loud).

Visualize! After reading a book without pictures, or just a few pictures, visualize(make a picture in your mind) what you have read to draw your own illustrations. You can even include speech bubbles and dialogue!
